Dear Mr. Watts:

Thank you for your letter of November 11th.

I apologize for the long delay in my reply. The crush of legislative business toward the end of the 1st Session of the 98th Congress was great, and did not allow me to respond to all of my constituents as quickly as I would like to.

I appreciate your comments in support of the present Administration and its policies, and agree with many of your general points on the character of Americans and the dilemmas which currently face us. I also share your shock and revulsion over the Korean plane incident. I believe it was an exceedingly cowardly and brutal act which cannot be forgotten as we continue our dealings with the Soviet Union.

With regard to your central point, that is, the need for unity in this country, I believe you are correct in your assertion that such unity is needed and would provide a powerful force in our national and international affairs. There is no doubt that if all America worked toward common goals, we would gain strength as a nation.

The essential problem, however, is that our very freedom -- which is the source of our strength -- can also be the source of our division. The free market and a lack of restraint on the individual helped build this country. Free inquiry and education helped mold our society and our leaders. But as we remain free, we remain free not only to support our government, but to dissent from its policies. I think it can be fairly said that without the freedom to criticize and differ, there can be no effective freedom to support, nor gather in a great unity of purpose of the magnitude which you propose.

In more concrete terms, I would also like to see our leaders united behind common goals and tackle the serious issues of national defense and the future direction of our economy. And, in fact, I believe there has been a limited degree of movement in this direction. The success of the bipartisan Social Security Commission and the Scowcroft Commission on the M-X indicate that it is possible for the government to move forward on some controversial issues.

However, in realistic terms, I believe we will continue to engage in the politics of division unless there are extraordinary circumstances. Quite frankly, 1984 is an election year; a year in which the two parties and outside candidates normally engage in strenuous debate and competition.

Altogether, I believe it can be said that our country benefits from the diversity of its society, yet suffers, as you point out, when different elements cannot sacrifice some of their personal interests for the common good. If we can be united, I believe it will be through the force of example, or through the exigencies of the moment. That is, I believe our country can be united through the force of leadership and the examples set by our elected representatives, or through outside forces beyond our control which threaten our security and national interests and demand concerted action. I certainly prefer the former, but can offer no precise mechanism to avoid the latter.

Once again, thank you for your letter. Again, please excuse the delay in my reply, and please keep me informed of your views.

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

Dear Mike.

The Soviet government could never get this co-operation and support from it's people. One very good reason is that they have never sparienced the taste of freedom. Their way of life as compared to ours would hardly be worth fighting for. over 25 years the Soviets have been planning our demise. As each day passes the show down becomes more inevitable .. Just for a minute I want you to envision, in a realistic scenario, the bloody path that they have chartered. Hungary, Poland, Afghanistan, just to name a few, and of course the most recent, their bold and brutal attack on KAL 007 Passenger Plane. It brings tears to my eyes when I allow myself to picture the true horror of this incident. The first picture that I always see is those precious little innocent children being blown apart, half allive and half dead hurtling through the freezing air only to be cast into the sea and eaten by the sharks.

Indirectly, but equally responsible, the Soviets undoubtly masterminded the vicious attack on our marines in Beirut. History has seldom ever recorded a more cowardly, unprovoked act against humanity. Even the attack on Pearl Harbor couldn't match this heinous deed. The liberation of Grenada was indeed an act borne of necessity. Any time that human life is lost it becomes difficult to justify, yet these sacrifices were not in vain. The price that our men paid served to circumvent a much greater loss of life and freedom in the not too distant future.

Our only hope for survival and freedom is unity. We must face reality in recognizing our enemy and never again be lulled into believing that we can co-exist





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peacefully without a strong America. Dear President Reagan:

Enclosed please find individual copies of 4 letters. Three were sent to Great Britain, Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, Canada, Prime Minister Piene Trudeau, and France, President F. Mitterand, respectively. The fourth was sent to my Congressman, Michael Bilirakis. It is self explanatory.

In reference to the first 3 letters, their contents are a reflection of my feelings in regards to the many distasteful and injurious remarks directed toward the United States immediately following the liberation of Grenada. These premature and erroneous remarks were too much! My feelings have long been held captive, the prisoners of profound frustration that increases each time that I hear the unjustified criticism of America but it is especially intensified when this criticism comes from our allies. I decided that the time had come to liberate those pent-up frustrations by putting them in the form of a letter and returning them to their original source. I wouldn't say that this method would be "fighting fire with fire" but I'm sure that they'll smell the smoke.

The time has come for America to assert herself by minimizing the diplomacy and placing more emphasis upon "straight talk", removing all doubt to both our allies and enemies alike, by projecting a clear picture of where we stand in regards to our overall security and future. Not only where we stand on these issues but more importantly how tall we stand when we choose to get up off our duff's and straighten up! This country can rally her sometime dormant but never absent resources to not only regain the superiority that we once enjoyed but clearly surpass that position.

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A word about Project America.

It is difficult to describe exactly what constitutes a clear description of Project America but I'll make an effort to depict a scenario that will at least provide you with a general idea. At present I have not solicited for membership therefore at this point I am the sole member. I'm presently in the process of carefully articulating the formulation of ideas and goals in order for prospective members to understand what we represent.

I believe that it would be appropriate to say that Project America advocates a much closer working relationship to be established between the citizens of America and our government. A liasion consistent of sincere and dedicated people who have the intelligence to analyze our problems, agree upon their significance on our society and to possess the perseverance necessary to implement the proper resolutions.

Some major issues that Project America supports, on a basis of priority, are the need for a stronger national defense plus the need for America to take a stronger stand in the stopping and regressing of Communism. These are the 2 major threats to not only our society but our very existence. Restoration of prayer in public schools, on an optional basis, allowing the majority to remain in the classrooms while the minority seek other facilities, such as the hall or auditorium. The implementation of an all out war on drug, utilizing programs designed by the government and effectuated by citizens and law enforcement agencies on all levels. The formulation and adoption of more specific laws designed to crackedown hard on drug traffickers and pushers, with no hope for probation or parole.

I see a genuine need for the reestablishment of trust and respect to be restored between government and grass-roots factions. Certain concessions on each side could accomplish this initially, at least to an acceptable degree.

Many people actually don't know that these extreme differences do in fact exist. I sincerely believe that well designed programs of this nature that exemplify these differences would tend to make Americans more appreciative of and thankful for their country.

Thank you for forwarding the petition relative to your strong support for the continuation of Social Security and Medicare.

When the Social Security Amendments came before the House of Representatives, I voted for passage of this legislation. There were provisions in the bill with which I disagreed, i.e., taxation of Social Security benefits and delay of the July 1 cost of living adjustment; however, under the parliamentary rules of the House, we could only vote for or against the bill as a whole without amendment. I felt it mandatory that immediate steps be taken to ensure the financial stability of Social Security and to restore the public's confidence in this vital system; thus, I supported passage.

As you are probably aware, the Congress has adjourned until next year. I want to assure you that I realize the importance of medicare and any legislation which comes to the floor of the House on this matter will have my closest attention.

I have held many town meetings and hosted a number of hearings of the House Committee on Aging in the Ninth District since being sworn into the Congress on issues of importance to senior citizens. I am acutely aware of the importance of both Social Security and Medicare to the folks who reside in our area. These concerns are foremost in my mind and will not be forgotten.

Dear Mike:

There are certain issues that must be addressed regarding both the farmers and migrant workers of our country. particular, the issue of the allocation and dispersal of funds that have been specifically earmarked as "Emergency Funds", set aside for the express purpose of helping the farmer and the worker to recover from miscellaneous types of severe crop damage such as the December freeze here in Florida. the farmer and the helper must be treated equally since one without the other equates out as nothing. They should be perceived as a package deal and treated accordingly. After properly determining that any incident does qualify as an emergency it should then be handled as such. The necessary provisions, having been made sufficiently in advance of the emergency, should immediately follow enabling the farmer and worker to suffer the least amount of lost time possible. An time that the farmer is inhibited, for any reason, the overall loss is shared by the entire country. If the government is going to extend low interest loans to the farmer they should, as an action deemed to be in their own best interests, expedite the loan while it can still be used effectively, and not prolong the issue to the point that it proves to be too late to salvage the damage. This failure to provide immediate assistance to the farmer has an even more devastating effect on the migrant worker. When the farmer can no longer afford to farm, as the result of insufficient funding, the migrant worker is idled. The choice of jobs for migrants in any community, even during good economic times, are few due to language barriers and the lack of proper qualifications required for most jobs. As a result of the December freeze wide spread hardships have befallen the migrants. Promised assistance in the form of emergency funds have been, to this date, non-existant. Yet, even if the assistance did come through, all at once, it would compute out to be approximately \$11.00 per person on a one time basis. Many haven't worked in seven weeks, therefore have no income. Evictions, repossesions, disruption of utilities and many other inconveniences have become common practice.

Hospitals refuse to admit their pick because they have no collateral. There is an acute lack of food, blankets and other essentials necessary to life. The most optomistic prediction for the new crops to bear is from 3 to 4 weeks. Most migrants are indebted so deeply that the money earned on the new crops will have to be used to repay their debts. When the harvest period ends here many won't be able to leave due to lack of funds and the loss of their vehicles, due to repossesion. This will have an adverse effect across the whole nation. I feel that this entire dilemma could have been prevented had someone been monitoring the situation properly and anticipated a possible emergency such as has happened and will no doubt happen again. We speak of allocations, grants, federal funding, etc., in the billions of dollars for possible long range interests such as the 8 billion dollars being considered for El Salvador. These are investments that promise no guarantee. I have no problem accepting these decisions. I believe that for the most part they are necessary and will, in the end, prove to be made in our own best interests. However, I do have a difficult time understanding why our government wastes so much vital time before appropriately responding to the critical needs of any vital interst of this country, but especially when those needs become a catalyst for human suffering and unnecessary hardships. I believe it would be fair to say that farming has proven its'self to qualify as a most vital interest. Let us remove the binoculars of long term interests for the time being and deal with the more immediate and more important problem that chose to prevail its'self upon us by the implementation and expedition

Dear Mr. Watts:

Thank you for contacting me to express your concern over the plight of migrant farm workers as a result of the unemployment caused by the Christmas weekend freeze.

I certainly understand and share your concern. The Governor's office and state and local agencies throughout Florida have worked very hard to assist these unemployed workers and to make emergency resources and services available to them. I have enclosed a summary of the actions that had been taken up to February 21 and more recent communications I have had with the State have assured me that these efforts have continued.

Thusfar, the Governor has not requested a Presidential disaster declaration, which would make federal unemployment assistance funds available to qualified unemployed workers. The reason for this is because thusfar, Florida's situation does not meet the requirements for such a designation. The available statistics do not indicate a large pool of workers who are unemployed and ineligible for state assistance, as was the case in Texas after the freeze. You may be sure, however, that I will lend my support to a request from the Governor should the collected data indicate that Florida meets the requirements for a Presidential disaster declaration. I am keeping in touch with the State on this matter.

I want to clarify that the emergency assistance from the Farmers Home Administration that has become available is not an outright gift or "handout." The assistance is in the form of low interest loans for which farmers, who have invested great sums of money in their farming operations, must qualify and which they must pay back over time. I was pleased to have played a part in securing the timely announcement of disaster assistance for Hillsborough, Pasco and Pinellas counties.

Please be assured that I am following this situation closely and

that the information I have indicates that all that can be done is being done.

I appreciate having the benefit of your views.
