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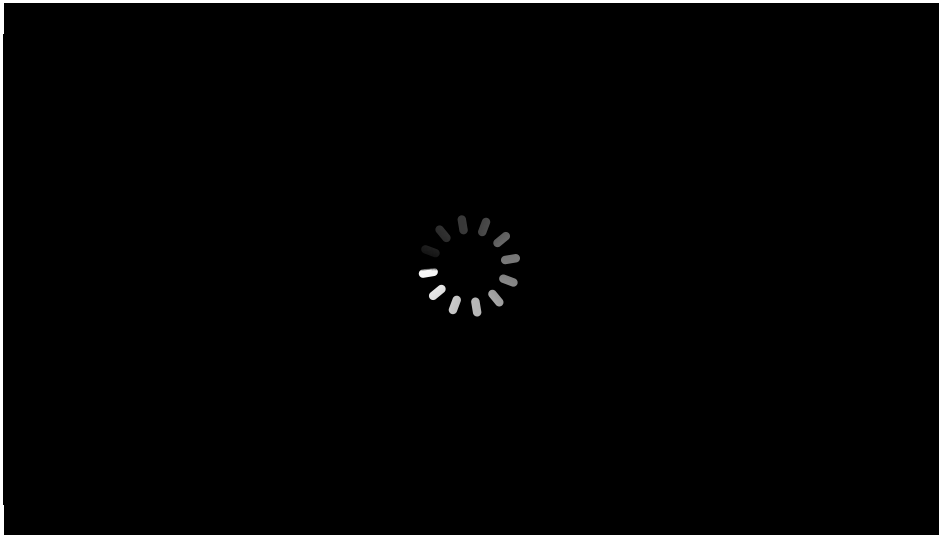
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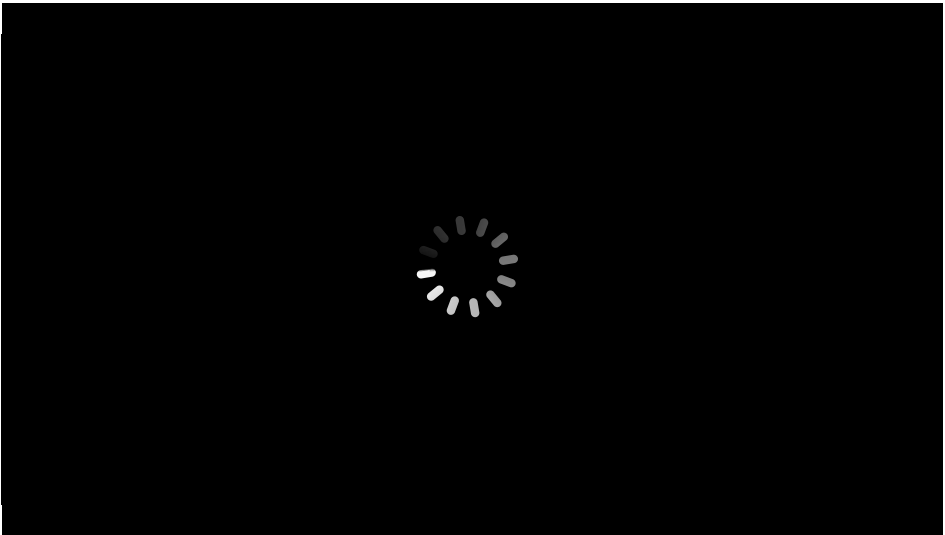

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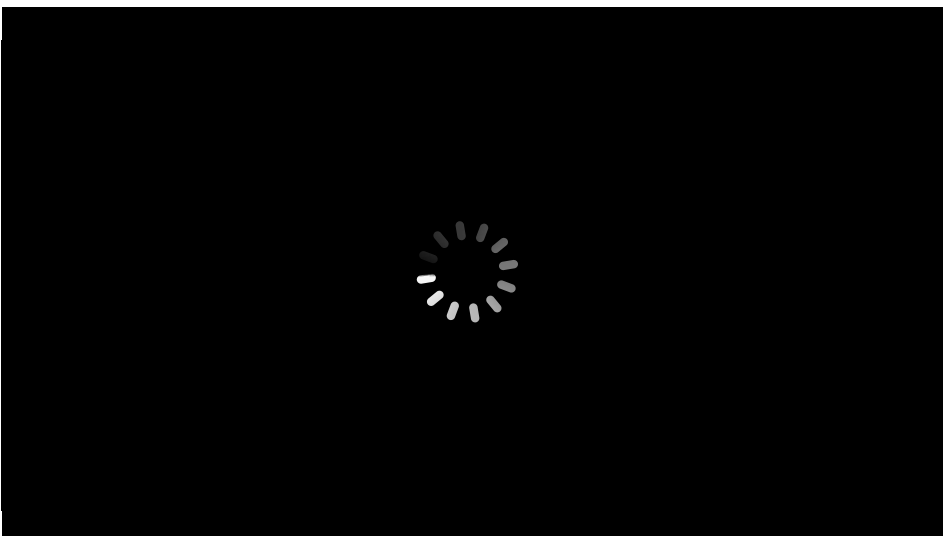


[Trump doubles-down on allies paying more for US protection, vows to repeal ObamaCare](#)

Republican presidential candidate Donald Trump doubled-down Sunday night on his comments that the US should “do a better deal” with Japan, South Korea and other allies, saying they should pay more for America’s protection while taking a greater role in their defense — including building their own nuclear weapons.

Responding to questions at a Fox News Channel “On the Record” town hall two days before the Wisconsin primary — where polls show he trails Ted Cruz — Trump also said that raising the minimum wage to \$15 an hour wasn’t good for business or jobs creation.



"If you start raising that minimum wage, you're going to make a lot of

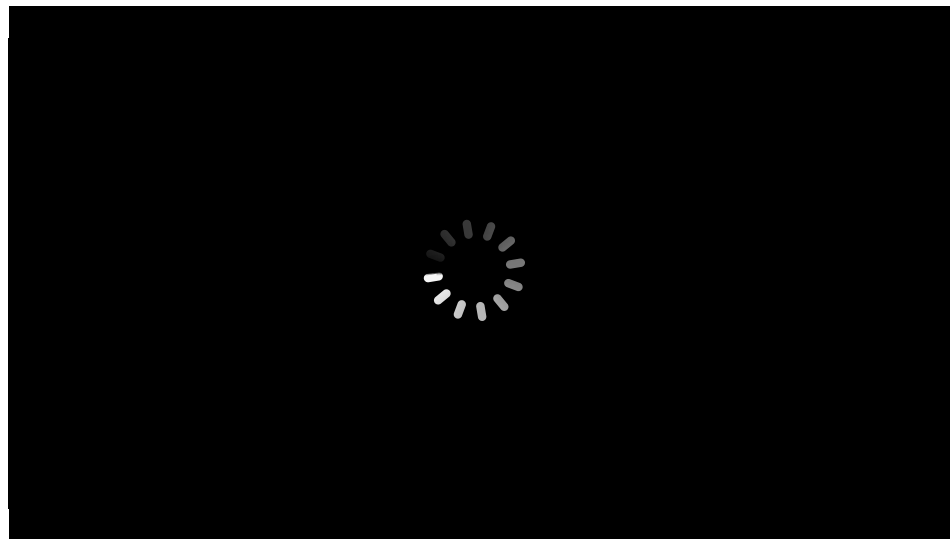
our companies even more non-competitive," he said.

Trump also delved into his plans to change the nation's tax code by "simplifying" it.

"The very rich are probably going to end up paying more, but there's an incentive for them to invest and create jobs in the country," he said.

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HIGHLIGHTS AND TRANSCRIPT OF 'ON THE RECORD'S' TOWN HALL WITH DONALD TRUMP

GRETA VAN SUSTEREN, HOST: Welcome to the great state of Wisconsin for ON THE RECORD'S one hour town hall with presidential candidate Donald Trump. First, a little political trivia. Wisconsin is the birthplace of the Republican Party, 1854 in the small town of Ripon. And as you all know, Wisconsin is a state of political passion and the site of hot political warfare. Governor Walker's Act 10 public bargaining reform sparked protests at the state capital, a recall effort to unseat Governor Walker and even a Senate walkout,

where state senators fled to the neighboring state of Illinois.

And now, all eyes are on this state. Wisconsin's primary is Tuesday and it's a big deal. It's a standalone primary. And there's been none in two weeks and there will not be another for two weeks. Our guest tonight, and joining me here at the University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee, is presidential candidate Donald Trump. Nice to see you, Donald.

DONALD TRUMP (R), PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE: Hi, Greta. Thank you very much.

VAN SUSTEREN: It's nice to see you.

(APPLAUSE)

VAN SUSTEREN: OK, Donald, the audience is going to ask you questions, but I'm going to take the first couple of questions. The first is you want to get rid of ObamaCare, right?

TRUMP: I do. I do.

VAN SUSTEREN: OK.

TRUMP: We will.

VAN SUSTEREN: All right.

TRUMP: We will repeal it. We'll replace it with something so much less expensive and so much better. It doesn't get worse, Greta.

VAN SUSTEREN: All right, so tell me what, if you are -- let's say a woman had cancer 20 years ago, in her early 20s, she's now early 40s, she has two children, single and there's no more ObamaCare. She's got breast cancer back again. Under TrumpCare, what will it look like?

TRUMP: Well, we'll take care of her. And, you know, we have so many options...

VAN SUSTEREN: How?

16:12:25 TRUMP: Well, let me explain something. We have so many options. We're getting rid of the lines between the states. We're going to have competition among all of these insurance companies that want to compete, although actually, they also like the monopoly. Right now, they mostly have monopolies in states. But we have, whether it's health care, I mean if you look at the health care, the savings accounts, if you look at -- there's probably nine different options.

The worst option is ObamaCare. And I don't know if you know it, and I can tell you the audience understands, 35, 45, 55 percent increase this year in premiums. The deductibles are so high, so outrageous, that unless you're just about ready to -- to go, you're never going to be able to use it. I mean you're not going to be able to use it. ObamaCare is a catastrophe. So we're going to take care of people. We're going to take care of people just like you said. We're going to have great health care for much less money.

TRUMP: Really, competition.

VAN SUSTEREN: -- because medical costs are going up?

You know, you'll get things that you won't use, but you're paying for them, whereas what we want, you can tailor-make it. Now, you're going to have a lot of options this way. You're going to have a lot of options. The insurance companies like the way it is, they're making a fortune, because one will have New York and one will have this -- you're going to have competition around. They're probably going to fight it. They've been fighting it. You know, when they approved ObamaCare, they almost got -- well, I call them the boundary lines of -- around each state. TRUMP: -- for years, I think, probably.

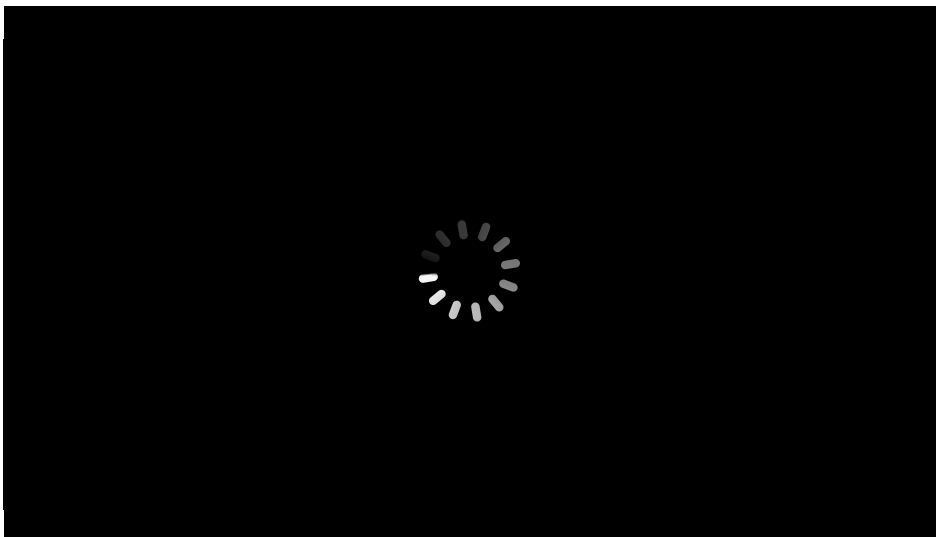
(APPLAUSE)

TRUMP: Probably since Ross Perot. I think I'm the only one since maybe Ross Perot. It's been, you know, many, many years. But I'm self-funding. So I'm going to do the right thing. And...

VAN SUSTEREN: Will it be universal health care, everybody will have health care?

TRUMP: It's going to be -- they're going to -- whoever wants it is going to have it...

VAN SUSTEREN: But you're going to have states...



TRUMP: -- whoever wants it.

VAN SUSTEREN: But I mean like I mean it's a money problem. I mean it's like, you know, people can't afford it.

(APPLAUSE)

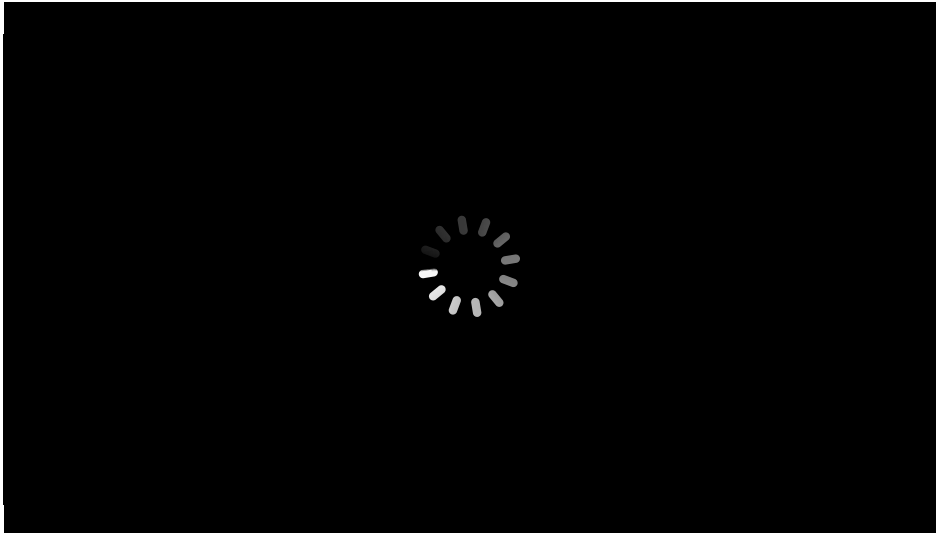
TRUMP: And the Republicans said, oh, oh, that's terrible, that's terrible, because -- look, you know, every time I speak and I say that to big audiences, they're Republicans, mostly. Although we're going to have a lot of Democrat turnovers, we're going to have a lot of -- we're going to have a lot of crossovers from Democrats because we have a very, very big election coming up right here in Wisconsin.

But everytime I said we're not going to allow people that have no money to die on the streets, I get standing ovations from Republicans. 16:16:00 TRUMP: And I said, my tone is going to change as soon as I finish the victory. I mean I have two left. We had 17. Now we have two left and I'm leading by a lot. I'm leading by millions of votes. You know, people don't talk about it. They say I'm leading by almost 300 delegates but I'm leading Cruz, who would be a terrible candidate, by the way. You talk about health care and other things...

(APPLAUSE)

TRUMP: -- he would be a terrible candidate.

(APPLAUSE)

TRUMP: I'm leading by hundreds of delegates, almost 300 delegates. But I'm leading by millions of votes, which nobody ever talks about. And yes, tone, to me, matters. Being presidential matters. My wife...

VAN SUSTEREN: What does that mean?

TRUMP: Well, let me tell you, my wife said, please, be more presidential. In other words, don't be so aggressive. And in a way, we want an aggressive president. I always sort of wanted it, but that's OK.

TRUMP: And my daughter said, the last debate, she said -- Ivanka. She just had a baby, by the way. I'm very

proud of that. That sort of why I'm doing this.

(LAUGHTER)

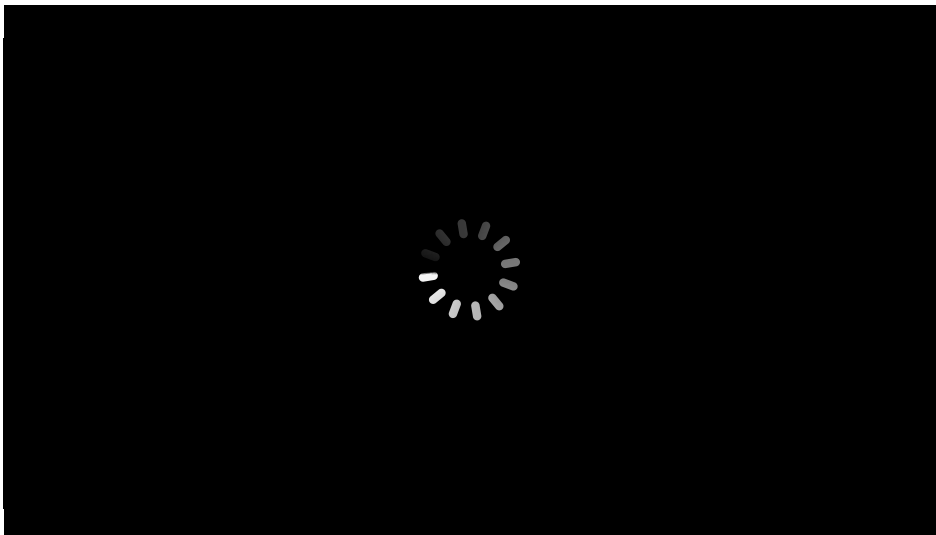
VAN SUSTEREN: All right, what does that mean, uh, you're going to stop Tweeting?

TRUMP: She didn't say that. I was surprised.

(APPLAUSE)

TRUMP: I was going to say let's do that introduction again, but I didn't want to do that.

But the truth is, I think some of it is because of social media.

VAN SUSTEREN: Um, abortion...

TRUMP: Yes?

VAN SUSTEREN: In 1999 to Tim Russert you were very pro-choice, were your words, although you said you didn't like it. And in the...

TRUMP: And that's true. That's a very important thing.

VAN SUSTEREN: No, I...

TRUMP: -- really, just before that, they never play that.

VAN SUSTEREN: I said it.

TRUMP: I was...

VAN SUSTEREN: I read it and I said it.

TRUMP: I was pained. I was pained (INAUDIBLE) but when they show it, because if they would go like 10 seconds before, I was pained when I said it. I was like oh, I -- you know, I -- like I really don't like it. Then I said very polite, but -- but -- but I am pro-life.

AMY: Hi, Mr. Trump.

TRUMP: Hi, Amy.

How are you?

AMY: Thank you for taking my question.

TRUMP: Thank you.

AMY: Great. Thank you.

TRUMP: Thank you.

AMY: My husband and I are hardworking middle class folks and every year at tax season, I'm always shocked to see how much we pay into taxes every year.

TRUMP: Yes.

AMY: I personally know people who have no jobs and no income who are getting \$4,000 to \$5,000 tax returns.

How can this happen and what are you going to do to create a tax system that is fair and balanced for everyone?

And we are coming to you from Milwaukee, where, on Tuesday, Wisconsin voters will hit the polls. Let's get right back to the questions. And when you see these big fat mergers and the companies get bigger, they get bloated and they don't do well. They don't do well. They don't even do well for their stockholders. But all of a sudden, they have -- they don't have the competition. And in the airline business, they have all these gates and nobody else can get in, nobody else can break the system. So I'd be very, very careful about that. I want to see competition at all levels.

VAN SUSTEREN: Donald, we have a question from an audience member, Ashley. First of all, who are you voting for on Tuesday? Will you tell us?

ASHLEY: Well, let's see how he answers my question.

VAN SUSTEREN: Very well. Sure. Go ahead.

(LAUGHTER)

ASHLEY: Well, I don't know how much you know about Wisconsin, but we have a lot to be proud of here -- the beer, the cheese, the Packers.

TRUMP: Right.

ASHLEY: For me, the thing I'm most proud of is our university system. We are incredibly blessed to have amazing public universities.

(APPLAUSE)

TRUMP: (INAUDIBLE). I've heard that from many people.

(LAUGHTER)

ASHLEY: In fact, we have to give our university a shout-out. We were just awarded R1 or Research 1 status this year, which is a big deal.

TRUMP: Good.

ASHLEY: Yes.

(APPLAUSE)

ASHLEY: My question, um, as a doctoral student and as someone who teaches undergraduates is, we're, of course, very worried about the rising cost of education...

TRUMP: Right.

ASHLEY: -- the ability of our students to be able to afford college tuition.

TRUMP: Right.

ASHLEY: Several other candidates have come out with their plans for

lowering or even free education at the public university level. Um, do you have a plan? And if so, do you have a way of paying for that plan?

16:35:39 TRUMP: Well, there's no such thing as free education, because you know that ultimately somebody else is going to be paying for that education. And so...

TRUMP: -- the taxpayers.

(APPLAUSE)

I'd love to say free education, but again, if somebody gets free education, all of the people paying, their rates are going to go up. I watch Bernie and Bernie, if you paid -- if you took 100 percent of everybody, you know, if their taxes were literally -- if everything was paid in taxes, they made nothing, you wouldn't be able to pay for it. So it's just words, OK? It's just words.

But I get that question more than any single question, especially because I've gotten to know so many young people, and they're so incredible. And I go to colleges. We have packed houses. And the first question I get always is student debt, and also, why is it so expensive? Two things are happening. The students become a conduit to the United States government and the colleges are not watching their costs. They don't care, because basically the students are here, the government gives them the money, and the college is here and the -- and you take a look at the way college costs are rising and there's no reason for it.

They are letting them go up. And the problem is the students are getting crushed, because, again, the government just keeps giving them more and more money, and the students give them to the college. So it's not fair. We're going to really look into that, because we have to keep it down. We have to keep it down. Some of the colleges do a good job. Many of them, I don't think they even care what the costs are, because they get so much money.

We are going to do something for the students. We've got to have something with extensions and lower interest rates and a lot of good things, because if we don't do that -- and Greta, it's unbelievable, I get this question so much and constantly, not even from students, from people that got crushed. Because the students are getting crushed. But I'll tell you the best answer of all, I'm going to create jobs. And people say, what does that have to do with it?

16:37:31 The biggest problem is you have student debt and you're a good student and you went to a wonderful college, everything is great, and then you look for a job and you can't get a job. VAN SUSTEREN: And we're back in Milwaukee with our special "On the Record" 2016 town hall with GOP presidential candidate, Donald Trump. Donald Trump is hoping for another big day this coming Tuesday. Of course, that's the day that the voters in the great state of

Wisconsin will hit the polls.

Donald, I want to ask you about North Korea and nuclear weapons. And I heard you the other day say that you would not -- when asked about South Korea and Japan having the possibility of nuclear weapons as a deterrent to North Korea, I wonder if that might not spark a large nuclear arms race, number one. And number two, do you worry that the odds of a terrorist group then getting access to nuclear arms is greatly enhanced unless we prevent South Korea and Japan from getting nuclear weapons.

Patrick, first of all, have you decided who you're voting for on Tuesday?

QUESTION: I'm swayed (ph) Trump but I'm here today to figure that out.

TRUMP: Good. All right. Well...

VAN SUSTEREN: Your question.

(CROSSTALK)

QUESTION: One, I'm a criminal justice major here at UW-M.

TRUMP: Good.

QUESTION: And I'm a proud brother of a police officer in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, (INAUDIBLE).

TRUMP: Good.

(APPLAUSE)

QUESTION: My question today for you Mr. Trump. America seems to be caught in the middle of a political storm with passions flaring from coast-to-coast. But I think one thing we can all agree on is the safety of every American, both abroad and at home. On August 19th, 2014, an American journalist named James Foley, a Marquette grad, in town, lost his life to the hand of evil. If you were to become president, what would you do to ensure the safety of everyone at home, everyone abroad, and those still missing, like Robert Levinson, who has been missing since 2007, with little known whereabouts?

16:45:30 TRUMP: He should come back with the Iran deal, I mean, assuming that he's alive, and I'm sure they know where he is.

QUESTION: I would have made that deal too.

TRUMP: Right. It's one of the worst deals every negotiated. And did you see Obama yesterday said he's very disappointed in Iran, you know, or something to the effect. I said, where has he been? I could have told him that long before they signed the deal.

VAN SUSTEREN: Welcome back to Milwaukee for our "On the Record" 2016 town hall with Donald Trump. And right now, let's get right back to the questions from our audience. Donald a question from Eric (ph). Eric, first of all, have you decided who you're going to vote for?

QUESTION: I'm leaning towards the Ohio governor, John Kasich.

TRUMP: That's a mistake.

(LAUGHTER)

QUESTION: But according to one of your opponents, that's like voting for you, so.

16:51:17 TRUMP: No, I actually think he hurts me more than he hurts Cruz, if you want to know the truth. And, you know, frankly, Kasich right now is -- he has got one win and 29 losses. And he shouldn't even be in it. But that's OK. Go ahead, ask your question.

QUESTION: Welcome back to Milwaukee. When you were here Tuesday evening, you attracted protesters who claimed that you were anti-immigration.

TRUMP: Yes.

QUESTION: I have not heard you say anything that could be interpreted as such. Instead I think what you're saying...

QUESTION: ... is that you would like the immigration laws that are currently in place to be enforced. So if you could please articulate what you would do as president to ensure American citizens are getting the jobs that are currently going to people who are in this country illegally.

TRUMP: And the young man talking about the policeman, he just said he's voting for Trump. So nice.

QUESTION: OK. So my question involves the drug problem in America today.

TRUMP: Right.

QUESTION: In particular the heroin epidemic. I'm a criminal defense attorney and I do a lot of work with the state public defender's

office, so I see every day people who have huge problems, their lives are ruined by drugs, in particular heroin. I see people that are on a long waiting list to even get into treatment. What would you do to help this drug epidemic in America?

VAN SUSTEREN: Is Wisconsin -- if you don't win Wisconsin, can you get to 1,237 delegates?

17:00:59 TRUMP: Yes, I think I can, because the polls just came out in New York, where they really know me best. I mean, the nice thing about it, you saw the New York polls, I'm through the roof, the people that know me best are giving me these fantastic -- I mean, they deal with me. They've had to live with me, unfortunately for them. But the truth is, the people that know me best have me -- Pennsylvania has been great. New York has been great. New Jersey has been great.

VAN SUSTEREN: And I've got to thank you for coming to my home state of Wisconsin.

TRUMP: Thank you.

VAN SUSTEREN: Thank you, Donald.

TRUMP: I love Wisconsin. Thank you.

VAN SUSTEREN: Very nice to see you.
